
VISION

The Henry Foundation gave a total of **116** grants to **94** organizations across the Permian Basin and greater United States.

The priority of The Henry Foundation remains in Midland, TX. Projects funded outside the region are given through board directed gifts or through the work of the second and third generation members.





GIVING BY GROUP




